


The Congo is the cradle and grave of empires




Historically there were a great number of power centers in Central Africa



These kingdoms built international reputations












This includes the Kingdom of the Kongo from 1390 to 1914

The *ndop* figure carries with it the power of the king serving as a "soul double" of the king.







Abstract, geometric forms in Kuba art



Beautiful forms that represent order and orderliness.



Kuba cloths are seen as status symbols worn by members of the ruling elite.



Woven by men and decorated by women At the center of the kingdom is the royal court.


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The king is adorned with regalia bedecked with abstract, geometric forms due to his role as the embodiment of law and order.



The king's regalia is named *bwaantshy*, which is made up of raffia cloth, animal skins, feathers, beads and cowrie shells. The king is the only person who inherits his title.



All other title-holders have their titles given to them by the king.

Title-holders gain the privilege of having a play put on during their funerals.






The personification of the king is called *Mwashamboy*.

His is stately, majestic and the embodiment of calm.






His costume is adorned with beads and cowrie shells, reflecting the prestigious garments worn by the king.




He is accompanied by his queen, Ngady a mwash who always wants to be the center of attention.
